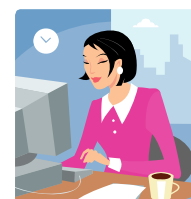

Author of the essay (last name first). Title of the essay (in quotes). Title of the Book (underlined). Ed. Editor's name. Place of publication: Publisher, Year. Page numbers of the essay.

Example:

McGinn, Anne. "Human Activities Threaten the World's Oceans and Coastal Regions." Endangered Oceans: Opposing Viewpoints. Ed. Louis Gerdes. San Diego: Greenhaven Press, 2004. 19-27.
